Coinciding with this spirit of seva, the college also embraced self-care and mindfulness by **celebrating International Yoga Day**. Under the guidance of Dr. Yogesh Mate, the session provided Warkaris and educators alike with tools to manage stress and enhance well-being through yoga and meditation.

The momentum of innovation continued with a **seminar on Artificial Intelligence in Academia**, conducted in collaboration with NIIT. Faculty were introduced to AI-powered tools that can transform teaching, research, and administrative efficiency—equipping them to lead in a digitally evolving educational landscape.

As June seamlessly transitioned into July, these initiatives laid a strong foundation for the academic journey ahead, culminating in a well-structured orientation for second- and third-year B.Com students. While July carried forward the momentum with its own set of academic and career-focused activities, June stands out as a month where tradition, technology, and compassion walked hand in hand—accompanying in a deeper, more purposeful approach to education.



July 2025

As the academic year 2025–26 began, St. Vincent College welcomed a new batch of students with a spirit of hope, purpose, and holistic formation. July has been a vibrant and transformative month, marked by orientation, reflection, and meaningful engagement, setting a strong foundation for the year ahead.

The month commenced with a comprehensive **orientation program for F.Y.B.A. and F.Y.B.Com** students, designed to guide them through their transition into college life. From 5th to 10th July, a series of insightful sessions introduced students to the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, the multidisciplinary curriculum, and the academic framework of their respective courses. The orientation also included a session by Unique Academy on Indian and international certification courses such as CA, CFA, and ACCA, broadening students' career perspectives. An anti-addiction seminar and an informative interaction with representatives from Swargate Police Station emphasized personal safety, discipline, and responsible citizenship.

Adding to the academic momentum, a **seminar on "Careers in Accounting and Finance"** was conducted on 10th July in collaboration with the Financial Planning Academy, Mumbai, providing commerce students with valuable insights into the financial sector and professional pathways.

The AICUF unit organized a **rural immersion program in Pathardi village**, **Nagar**, under the guidance of Dr. Gilbi John and Dr. Milind Gaikwad. Students lived with the local community, learned about the Karanji watershed project from Father Sunil, interacted with the Dombari acrobats and Kumbharwada potters, and visited the Medical Mission Sisters' neonatal care center, deepening their understanding of rural life and social justice.

In celebration of the Feast of St. Ignatius of Loyola, AICUF hosted "Embark", a freshers' meet anchored by Brother Irivo, Amar, and Naveen, fostering fellowship and introducing new students to the values of faith and service. This was followed by an **elocution competition** on 30th July on the theme "Impact of St. Ignatius of Loyola", where students eloquently reflected on his enduring legacy in education and spirituality.

The month of July also saw a **Parents-Teachers Meeting** on 12th, which strengthened collaboration and transparency by informing parents about NEP, academic policies, and student support systems. TNS Placement drive



On 5th June 2025, St. Vincent College hosted the "Campus to Tech-enabled Financial Careers (C2FC) Career Fest 2024–25," a dynamic placement drive organized by the TNS India Foundation. The event marked a significant milestone in the college's efforts to bridge the gap between academic learning and industry-ready career pathways, particularly in the

rapidly evolving intersection of finance, technology, and digital services. The career fest attracted over 90 enthusiastic students from St. Vincent College as well as several other institutions across Pune, creating a vibrant atmosphere of ambition, preparation, and opportunity.

The day began with a brief orientation session where representatives from the TNS India Foundation outlined the objectives of the initiative, emphasizing the importance of adaptability, digital literacy, and soft skills in today's competitive job market. Students were encouraged to embrace tech-enabled roles that value both domain knowledge and technological skills. The placement process that followed was structured to assess candidates through a combination of aptitude evaluations, communication rounds, and personal interviews, ensuring a holistic review of each participant's potential.



St. Vincent College expressed its gratitude to the TNS India Foundation for their vision and execution, and reaffirmed its commitment to hosting such career-enabling initiatives regularly.





FDP for faculty



From 15th June 2025, St. Vincent College hosted a week-long Faculty Development Program (FDP). Organised with the intention of deepening both professional competence and institutional identity, the program brought together faculty members from across departments for a series of thoughtful sessions that blended academic insight with ethical grounding. The FDP began with a powerful address by a Fr. John Ravi SJ from Delhi, whose deep engagement with educational policy offered a nuanced understanding of the National Education Policy (NEP) and its far-reaching implications. He didn't just outline structural

changes—multidisciplinary learning, credit systems, or skill integration—but framed them within a larger question: What kind of education do we want to offer in a time of rapid change? Several other Jesuit educators

from the Pune Province joined as resource persons, each bringing years of experience in both academic and administrative roles. Father Robert, in particular, led a series of engaging sessions on academic leadership, classroom management, and the everyday realities of teaching in a diverse college environment. Speaking with warmth and candor, he shared practical strategies for building trust with students, managing difficult conversations, and creating a classroom atmosphere where every student feels seen. He emphasized that discipline isn't about control, but about creating a space where learning can truly happen.



A significant part of the week was dedicated to Ignatian Pedagogy. The idea that teaching begins with knowing the student, not just the subject, resonated deeply. Discussions on Jesuit values—cura personalis (care for the whole person), Magis (the pursuit of excellence), and men and women for and with others—were woven naturally into the sessions.





The week unfolded at a gentle pace—long enough to absorb ideas, pause, and rethink. There were no flashy presentations or overwhelming schedules. Instead, there were conversations over tea, shared meals, and moments of silence that allowed space for introspection. By the end, many faculty members remarked not on how much they had "learned," but on how they felt reconnected—to their purpose, to each other, and to the deeper reason they chose teaching in the first place.

Participation, social outreach on occasion of Wari



On the morning of 21st June 2025, as the sacred Palkhi of Lord Vitthal began its grand arrival in Pune, the spirit of seva (selfless service) came alive through a heartfelt social outreach initiative led by the faculty members Dr. Gilbi John, Dr. Vishal Bhavre and the NSS unit of St. Vincent College. Guided by Dr. Vishal Bhavre, the NSS programme officer, the team gathered

early at a designated resting point along the pilgrimage route to welcome the weary Warkaris who had walked miles, often for days, in devotion and faith. The event was not organized as a formal programme, but rather as a genuine expression of respect and solidarity with the pilgrims, rooted in the values of compassion, community, and cultural reverence.



Understanding the physical toll of the long journey, the team focused on offering simple yet meaningful support. Volunteers set up a small but well-organized service station where arriving pilgrims were warmly greeted and offered cool drinking water, ORS packets, nimbu pani, and light snacks such as chana, poha, and biscuits—nourishment that could replenish their energy and sustain them for the next leg of their journey. Hygiene kits containing hand sanitizers, wet wipes, and caps were also distributed, especially helpful in the summer heat. For the elderly and those showing signs of fatigue, volunteers provided shaded resting spots and

assisted with footwear care, mending torn slippers where possible.



What made the outreach particularly touching was the personal connection it fostered. Faculty members and students didn't just hand out items—they sat beside the pilgrims, shared conversations, listened to their stories of faith and struggle, and at times, even joined them in singing abhangs. The presence of the NSS unit gave the effort a sense of purpose and continuity, aligning with the spirit of civic responsibility that the organization stands for.



Yoga day Workshop



Under Dr. Mate's expert guidance, participants engaged in a well-structured yoga session that included a series of preparatory warm-up exercises, a sequence of asanas (yoga postures) aimed at improving flexibility, strength, and posture, followed by pranayama (breath control techniques) to enhance respiratory efficiency and mental clarity. The session also incorporated a guided meditation practice, allowing attendees to experience deep relaxation and mental rejuvenation. Special attention was given to yoga practices that alleviate common issues faced by educators and students—such as back pain, eye strain, fatigue, and anxiety—by incorporating gentle stretches, neck and shoulder

Seminar on AI for the faculty



A seminar on the application of Artificial Inteligence (AI) in academic and research practices was successfully conducted for the faculty members of St. Vincent College on 24th June 2025. Organized in collaboration with NIIT, the seminar aimed to equip educators with practical knowledge

and tools to integrate AI into their teaching methodologies, research work, and administrative tasks. The session was led by Mr. Shubham Rajput, a seasoned resource person and AI specialist from NIIT, who brought valuable industry insights and hands-on expertise to the discussion. The theme of the seminar, "Leveraging AI for Teachers: Enhancing Research, Teaching, and Productivity," resonated strongly with the participants, reflecting the growing need for digital transformation in higher education.

The seminar began with an overview of AI and its evolving role in the education sector. The resource person explained how AI is not merely a technological advancement but a powerful enabler that can streamline academic workflows, support data-driven research, and foster innovative teaching strategies. Faculty members were introduced to a range of AI-powered tools designed specifically for educators, including platforms for automating lesson planning, generating interactive content, creating assessments, and providing personalized feedback to students. Demonstrations were conducted to show how



tools like AI-based summarizers, citation generators, grammar enhancers, and literature review assistants can significantly reduce the time and effort involved in academic writing and research documentation.



The session concluded with a hands-on demonstration and a question-and-answer round, during which faculty members actively participated, sharing their challenges and seeking practical solutions.



Orientation for the S.Y. and T.Y.B.Com

A comprehensive orientation program was conducted on 25th and 26th July 2025 for the second and third-year Bachelor of Commerce students at St. Vincent College, Pune. The orientation for second-year students focused on the academic structure and opportunities introduced under the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. Students were given a thorough understanding of the NEP's key components, including the Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS), interdisciplinary learning, multiple entry and exit options, and a flexible curriculum that encourages holistic development. Emphasis was placed on the importance of credit accumulation, semester-wise planning, and the grading system. The session also covered the process of selecting specializations and elective subjects, enabling students to make informed decisions based on their interests and career goals. Various subject categories such as Discipline-Specific Electives, Generic Electives, and Skill Enhancement Courses were explained in detail, highlighting their academic and practical relevance. Students were introduced to digital learning platforms, library resources, and mentorship initiatives available at the college to support their academic journey.

In contrast, the orientation for third-year students was designed in alignment with the 2019 university syllabus pattern, as this batch is not governed by the NEP framework. The session provided a detailed overview of the final-year curriculum, with attention to advanced and application-based subjects that form the core of their academic year. Guidance was given on the completion of the mandatory research project, including topic selection, methodology, report writing, and presentation skills. Faculty emphasized the importance of timely submission and academic integrity in project work. In addition, students received valuable insights into career pathways, including options for higher education such as postgraduate programs and professional certifications. Information was shared about competitive entrance exams, skill development courses, and certification programs that can enhance employability. A segment on placement opportunities and alumni experiences was included to inspire students and help them visualize their future trajectories. The role of internships, soft skills, and professional networking was also discussed to prepare students for the transition from college to career.

The program concluded with an interactive question-and-answer session that allowed students from both years to clarify doubts related to academics, examinations, project work, and future planning.





July 2025

Orientation for F.Y.B.Com Students



An orientation program for the first-year Bachelor of Commerce (F.Y.B.Com) students was conducted at St. Vincent College from 5th to 10th July 2025, marking the beginning of their academic journey with a comprehensive and enriching introduction to

college life, curriculum, and values. The five-day program was meticulously planned to help students transition smoothly from high school to higher education by familiarizing them with the academic framework, institutional ethos, and various support systems available on campus.

The inauguration of the orientation took place on 5th July 2025 with a warm welcome and an insightful session by Dr. Franklin Salvi, who introduced the students to the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. He explained its transformative vision, including the multidisciplinary structure, choice-based credit system,





and skill-oriented learning, helping students understand the flexibility and opportunities within their course. This was followed by an inspiring address by Fr. Robert Das, S.J., who spoke on the theme of nurturing responsible and dynamic youth, encouraging students to develop leadership, integrity, and social consciousness. A subsequent session by Mr. Radhakrushna Thange, Sister Mareena and Dr. Archana Nair provided an overview of the various student clubs, associations, and forums in the college, emphasizing the importance of co-curricular participation in holistic development.



On the second day, Mr. Renson Vaz delivered a career-oriented session on the journey from campus to corporate life, highlighting the diverse career paths available to commerce students and the skills required to succeed in a competitive environment. Mr. Shahzad Nariman then conducted a practical workshop on making effective PowerPoint presentations, a vital skill for academic and professional success. The session was interactive and well-received, enabling students to enhance their communication and presentation abilities. The session was led by Sister Mareena, who guided the students through a comprehensive overview



of the NEP framework, explaining its key components such as the multidisciplinary approach, choice-based credit (CBCS), semester system pattern, skill-enhancement courses, and the concept of multiple exit and options. She also elaborated on the college's pedagogical methods, emphasizing the shift from rote learning to

student-centered, experiential, and holistic learning. Students were introduced to the academic calendar, internal assessment structure, and the importance of co-curricular and community engagement in their overall development.

The session also covered emerging trends such as digital accounting, automation in finance, and the role of data analysis in financial decision-making.

The introduction of the Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS), the semester pattern, and the holistic progress card were explained in simple terms, ensuring that parents could grasp how their children's academic performance would be assessed and nurtured under the new system. Special attention was given to demystifying concepts such as multilingualism, Indian knowledge systems, and experiential learning, which are integral to the NEP's vision.

In addition to academic updates, the meeting also covered broader aspects of campus life, including attendance norms, examination procedures, co-curricular opportunities, and student support services such as counseling and career guidance. Parents were introduced to the college's digital platforms used for academic communication and progress tracking, reinforcing the institution's commitment to transparency and regular feedback. The role of mentors and class teachers in monitoring student engagement and well-being was also highlighted. This was followed by an interactive session, during which parents actively participated by asking questions and sharing their concerns and the faculty members responded with patience and clarity, addressing all the queries.

TNS India Foundation CSR project - Free training on Excel and Power BI

Under the Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiative of TNS India, a three-month skill development course in Microsoft Excel and Power BI was launched at St. Vincent College in June 2025 and will continue until the end of August 2025. The program aims to empower students with in-demand digital skills that enhance employability and support academic excellence.









Rural Immersion Programme

The course is being conducted by multiple trained faculty members from TNS India, a reputed organization in the field of education and skill development. Their expertise ensures that students receive high-quality, hands-on training in data management, analysis, visualization, and reporting tools widely used across industries. The training is being offered free of cost, making it accessible to all students, particularly those from economically underprivileged backgrounds. It aligns with the college's mission of holistic and inclusive education, while also bridging the digital skill gap among youth.



The AICUF (All India Catholic University Federation) Unit of St. Vincent College successfully conducted a transformative Rural Immersion Program in Pathardi village, Nagar district, from 22nd to 24th of July. The program, aimed at fostering social awareness, empathy, and experiential learning, was conducted under the able guidance of faculty member Dr. Gilbi John, whose constant support enriched the students' understanding throughout the journey.

The students were warmly hosted by a Jesuit, Father Sunil, a dedicated social worker and community leader, who served as their guide and mentor during the immersion. He provided insightful orientation on the Karanji Watershed Program, a pioneering community-led initiative for water conservation and sustainable agriculture which has transformed the agrarian economy and ecological health of the region.

As part of the cultural and social exposure, students visited Kumbharwada, where they interacted with local potters. They also met the Dombari community, traditional acrobats and performers, who shared their rich cultural heritage, folk art, and the socio-economic struggles they face preserving their identity contemporary society. The students further engaged with the Medical Mission Sisters, who run a neonatal care



hospital and a hostel for girls in the village. Additionally, the immersion included a session on horticulture farming, where local farmers introduced the students to sustainable farming practices, organic cultivation, and



the economic potential of horticulture in rural livelihoods.



Seminar by Poise academy on "Careers in aviation industry"



A career awareness seminar on "Careers in the Aviation Industry" was successfully organized at St. Vincent College on 24th July in the college seminar hall. The event was conducted in collaboration with Poise Academy, a well-known air hostess and aviation career training institute based in Pune, recognized for its professional grooming and placement-oriented programs. The seminar aimed to guide and inspire

students—especially those interested in dynamic, service-oriented careers—about the diverse opportunities in the aviation sector, with a special focus on roles such as flight attendants (air hostesses/stewards), ground staff, customer service executives, and hospitality personnel in airports and airlines.

The session was led by trained professionals and career counselors from Poise Academy, who shared valuable insights into the structure of the aviation industry, eligibility criteria, and the step-by-step pathway to entering the field. They emphasized the importance of personality development, communication skills, grooming, and confidence—key attributes required for success in this competitive sector. This seminar served as a significant step in career guidance, helping students understand the realities and rewards of a career in aviation and equipping them with direction and motivation.
