Interfaith Dialogue Seminar and Felicitation Ceremony On the morning of July 3, 2025, St. Vincent College hosted an Interfaith Dialogue Seminar, organized by the All India Catholic University Federation (AICUF) in close collaboration with the Snehsadan Institute, college faculty, and institutional leadership. The event marked the formal conclusion of a year-long series of interfaith engagements initiated to nurture mutual understanding, respect, and collaborative coexistence among individuals of diverse religious traditions. Held in the college at 10:30 a.m., the seminar embodied the institution's enduring commitment to fostering a culture of dialogue as a vital response to rising social fragmentation and identity-based tensions. The seminar provided a reflective and inclusive space where participants—students, faculty, and community members—engaged with the ethical and spiritual dimensions of interreligious harmony. Discussions centered on the role of empathy, active listening, and shared humanity in bridging theological and cultural differences. Rather than focusing on doctrinal debate, the emphasis remained on lived experience, common values, and the practical work of building trust across communities. The event underscored a core conviction: that sustained, grassroots dialogue is not merely an idealistic aspiration but a necessary practice for democratic resilience and social cohesion. Following the seminar, a Felicitation Ceremony was held to acknowledge and honor individuals whose consistent dedication had been instrumental in shaping and sustaining the year-long interfaith journey. The Chief Guest, Reverend Father Dr. Francis Gonsalves, S.J., a respected theologian, former Dean of Theology						



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at Jnana Deepa Vidyapeeth, and a nationally recognized voice for interreligious understanding, delivered a thoughtful and stirring address. He commended the initiative as “a courageous and prophetic witness” in an era marked by increasing polarization, highlighting how such efforts reaffirm education’s role in cultivating peacebuilders rather than bystanders.

Five individuals were formally recognized for their exceptional contributions: Mr. Ervad Jamshed, a Zoroastrian community leader, Ms. Jacinta Bastian, Mr. Shamsuddin Tamboli, Mr. N.P. Bakshi, and Father Peter D’Cruz, S.J. Each honoree received a token of appreciation and a citation acknowledging their role in advancing a shared vision of unity without uniformity. Their collective efforts—spanning workshops, shared prayer reflections, community service projects, and public conversations—had not only deepened interfaith literacy within the college but also inspired students to see diversity as a source of strength rather than division.

The program concluded with a moment of shared silence and a collective pledge to continue nurturing spaces where differences are respected, voices are heard, and common ground is actively cultivated. In both tone and substance, the event reflected St. Vincent College’s identity as a Jesuit institution committed to faith that does justice—one that engages the world not through isolation, but through encounter, humility, and hope.

This culminating seminar and felicitation served not as an endpoint, but as a reaffirmation of an ongoing commitment: that dialogue, when rooted in sincerity and sustained by action, remains one of the most powerful tools for healing and humanization in contemporary society.
